One of his favorite campus ministry activities was to invite his students into his home for supper and, after eating, they would sit around the table and, (likely with a beer in hand), Luther would speak to the subjects and issues raised by listeners. Fortunately, one of his students, Johannes Matthesius, had the foresight to writer Luther's observations down which were later published in volume called TABLE TALK.


It's the most wonderful time of the year! There'll be much Facebook postings and hearts will be glowing with computer screens!
