A LETTER FROM LCC PASTOR

One night as I was preparing a report for a Board meeting, it hit me. We are caring for these students and this community- mind, body, and spirit. Of course I had recognized this prior to a couple months ago, but, based on what has been happening this semester in particular, the realization surfaced anew...

Mind. During Independent Theo(logy), we begin by naming our intentions for the next hour, such as radical listening. By that, we mean: listen not to respond, but to understand. Listen in this moment without expecting ourselves or others to have this same understanding forever. We listen with the expectation that we may be changed and that others may change their minds in the future. We invite people to bring their "2am questions" and to respond to current events, including the ELCA draft social statement on Women & Justice.

Body. For the second time this year SNAP Educator Annette Shepardson offered a hands-on class aimed at cooking healthy on a budget. Alumna Olivia Wulf led mindfulness-based improv for the LCC and RunnerUP, the improv club at Winona State University. Through laughter and games, we explored mindful practices, such as listening, breathing, and showing compassion. Each week we continue to be blessed by many who provide a home-cooked meal for students before worship.

Spirit. In February, my mom came to the LCC with needles and yarn, offering gifts and her wisdom in knitting as another tool for students to de-stress. That same night WSU counselor Eunie Alsaker joined us to lead a discussion on anxiety, depression, and stress. Coming in April, we'll welcome a group of people for a panel discussion on vocation. So often students feel pressed to map out their entire college career before they step foot on campus and then feel like something is wrong with them when that doesn't go as planned. Later, they feel pressed to map out their lives and a career. My hope is that this night will offer them a more holistic and realistic picture of life so that they can get creative and curious to ask: Where do my greatest passions and joys meet the world's deepest needs?

These stories scratch the surface of a community steeped in the astounding grace of God in Christ Jesus. And the words "THANK YOU" but scratch the surface of a community steeped in gratitude for all of you. -Pastor Corrine




