During that time he said (again) how convinced he is that campus ministry is leading the church into the future, namely through hospitality and engagement with the wider world outside our doors.



It was time for a story.

I talked about a Friday evening in which I ventured up to my favorite tree in Winona atop Garvin Heights. There were two college women already at the spot, and they invited me to sit with them. Other times I might have declined, not wanting to intrude, but something called me to stay that night. (Hmm, Holy Spirit.) We sat together for over an hour, talking about life, travels, college, faith, etc. At one point one of the students said she had been searching for a campus ministry in Winona, so I invited her to the LCC. But here's the thing—that wasn't even the point of this serendipitous spirit-filled moment at a tree. The point was that moment. In the world. Holding conversation and meeting one another where we were. God was present there just as much as God was present when she did walk through the LCC doors Sunday night for dinner. And even if that student never becomes a leader for the LCC or a "regular," she is part of our ministry. She is in the world, and so are we. When students tell me how they feel a tugging now and then to sit with someone, how they do sit, and how hope is born in both of them because of that sitting, I smile. For we are engaged with the wider world together.

That is what the church is. That's what makes church different from other clubs or organizations one can "join" or become a "member" of. That is what makes campus ministry different. We're not about memberships and status and statistics and metrics the way the rest of the world is basically obsessed with. We are obsessed with meeting people where they are in the world and sharing the love of God at every table, even at a tree. Join us.

### Message From Alumni: Lisa J. Boden Felchle – 1999 WSU Graduate

From 1996 to 1999, I was involved in Lutheran Campus Center (LCC), which was under the direction of Pastor

John Carrier. As a social work and psychology major, I was first drawn to the LCC ministry due to the humanitarian work and outreach ministry. During spring break and summer break I participated in various humanitarian work to include feeding homeless in Denver, Colorado, building homes in San Diego, CA and volunteering at the Aids Memorial Quilt on display at that National Mall in Washington, DC. For one year, I lived in the LCC house, which was open to all students, prior to moving offices to the current location. I was a student on staff for two years and assisted in administrative support to services, planned ministry events, wrote articles for the newsletter, and conducted outreach to other students.



In 1999, I graduated from Winona State University and commissioned in the Minnesota Army National Guard. I worked in the United Kingdom, taught English in Japan for two years, deployed to Bosnia-Herzegovina, worked for the Army in Germany for two years, deployed multiple times to Iraq and currently work full-time as a civilian for the Army and work part-time as a Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Army Reserves. I am married to my husband, Chris and am blessed with two beautiful children, Owen (4 yrs.) and Teagan (1 yr.).

My family is active in a non-denominational Christian church. My husband volunteers on the medical team, and I teach Sunday school to 3-5 year-old children. 
